

"AMERICA'S GRIOT"

"...SHE'S A CANVAS THAT SHE PAINTS PEOPLE ON..."

KIJANA WISEMAN, M.Ed. is a master-degreed lyric coloratura with a 3.5 octave range. As THE GRIOT, she uses music, dynamic storytelling, comedy, costumes, characterizations and audience participation to joyously uses her "edutain" audiences—then mold them with laughter.

Kijana has lived and performed in 20 countries on the American, African and European continents. As "The Griot", she astonishes—shifting genres as easily as her slides and on-stage costume changes. Inviting her multi-cultural audience to join her on a time trip to the dawn of music, she first makes them one people—again ("just with many paint jobs!"), then teaches them a South African "click" song for a wedding they'll be attending. The story progresses as she becomes a slave, gospel choir director, toddler, vaudeville artist, opera and jazz singer—demonstrating how music unifies mankind.




Audiences participate as her "Griot Chorus" and learn much more than music. High points of the show occur throughout, whether it's when she pulls audience members to the stage to dance at an African wedding they'll be attending; when she does a blues version of "Summertime" or struts her stuff while performing vaudeville's "I Can't Do Without My Kitchen Man." She even



throws money around the stage while singing "God Bless the Child"...then uses the song as an object lesson for maintaining "dignity" for those who scramble to grab the cash.

"Each audience is different..." says Kijana, "...and I like playing with people—from children to adults, so the Griot is full of audience participation. I adjust the level of the performance to match the age or needs of the participants. My job's simple...to musically and

comically stir the cultural multi-mix of my "class," and allow them to first embrace their common roots, then taste its muticultural flavor with me... not just watch and applaud. My brand of diversity is inclusive."

Kijana was a performing member of SssteaMoga in West Africa and worked as an international model for a Merz Skin Care products in Munich, Germany and Champion products of Madrid Spain.

In the United States, she has performed with the Conrad "ThunderSoul" Johnson Big Band, The Masterworks Chorus, The Drifters, the Houston Symphony Chorus, and Masterworks Chorus. Her vocal coach was international operatic tenor soloist David Brewer.

Kijana has won 1st place in the City of Houston Talent Competition and was a certified Texas Commission on the Arts Touring Roster Artist for over 5 years. In 2002, she was voted APCA's "Best College Performing Artist of the Year" and her audience participatory musica time trip, "The Griot" won "Best College Diversity Program" for 2001 & 2002. Kijana is the eldest child of award-winning educator Mary Wiseman, M.Ed. and the late El'Ray Wiseman, Sr., is happily married to Aundra Sebastian Fusilier.
